By exploring the culture of other countries and the importance of significant people from France e.g. Edith Piaf, Napoleon Bonaparte, Claude Monet, Coco Chanel, Marie Curie, Charles de Gaulle, Marie Antoinette, Joan of Arc, Paul Pogba etc. By taking part in cultural occasions and appreciating a range of cultural influences that have shaped their own heritage and those of others. Pupils recognise the range of different cultures within school and further afield as an essential element of their preparation for life in modern Britain. We learn about housing, school and holidays in France.
